· Introduction

Due to repairs necessitated by the 2024 Noto Peninsula Earthquake, The Fourth High School Memorial Museum of Cultural Exchange, home to the Ishikawa Modern Literature Museum, is presently closed. Taking this closure as an opportunity to positively showcase valuable archival materials, we have decided to hold an "Outing Exhibition" at the Ishikawa Prefectural History Museum. This large-scale traveling exhibition from the Ishikawa Modern Literature Museum is the first since its inauguration at the Tōbu Department Store, Ikebukuro in 1987.

The exhibition is a literary display unique to a comprehensive literature museum, where the distinctiveness of each writer shines through handwritten manuscripts, letters, and cherished everyday items. In addition to materials from authors native to Ishikawa Prefecture such as Izumi Kyōka, Tokuda Shūsei, and Murō Saisei, visitors can also enjoy unexpected items from other renowned writers including paintings and crafts, far from the typical image of a literary museum.

Spring Scenes

Poetry and songs depicting spring will be presented through handwritten materials including colorful calligraphy scrolls. Visitors can immerse themselves in the freshness of the season as portrayed by the authors' vibrant sensibilities, including haiku, tanka, poetry and more.

Faces of Authors



Notable Sayings and Maxims


